## About this Report

This report was prepared by the Planning Council for Health and Human Services, Inc. (the Planning Council), which promotes community planning as a systematic way of viewing community issues and developing planned solutions to address those issues. Principles of effective community planning include engaging broad and diverse sectors of the community, securing committed leadership, reliance on objective data and information to inform decisions and determine actions, placing emphasis on measurable results, and focusing on systems change, sustainability, and long-term solutions. A variety of planning approaches and techniques can be employed to meet these objectives. This report was prepared under contract with Fighting Back, Inc. for the Alliance for Wisconsin Youth Southeastern Regional Center to assist a regional consortium of drug prevention organizations to gather basic demographic information about the region to be used as a backdrop for future research.

Data in this report are from the U.S. Census Bureau 2006 American Community Survey (ACS)<sup>1</sup>. ACS provides the most current and consistent information available in place of the decennial census. The data provided in ACS are estimates and the small sample sizes increases sampling error. Certain data such as age and household income are listed in ACS by median average. The mean average may be a more accurate way to measure central tendency. Nevertheless, the Planning Council determined that ACS data provides the most robust demographic information available and is a widely accepted measure for information on communities. Data on population estimates on race and ethnicity in Ozaukee and Washington counties were accessed using the U.S. Census Bureau Federal-State Cooperative Program for Population Estimates. Please refer to the appendices in this report for detailed information listed in the profiles.

## Regional Center Representatives

The State of Wisconsin's Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS) developed regional centers in August 2007 to address alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse by focusing on prevention. There are five regional centers across the State. These regional centers were designed to link community coalitions to one another, build their capacity to perform prevention, and increase collaboration with the State. Regional prevention centers provide a framework for cross-system work, information sharing, coordination of services, and training.

Since August 2007, the Southeastern Regional Center has participated in a steering committee to provide input into the prevention re-design process, and a workgroup to identify training needs for coalitions. Goals for the 2007-2008 year, set by the Regional Center, were to increase dialogue among prevention organizations and coalitions within the region, develop regional and county profiles, and assess the capacity of Alliance for Wisconsin Youth members.

The Planning Council provided facilitation and consultative support to the Southeastern Regional Center. Representatives convened meetings every other month. This group continues to meet.

## Southeastern Wisconsin Profile

### Regional Demographic Highlights

- Eighteen percent of the Southeastern Region's residents have a bachelor's degree.
- The lowest and highest median rent in the Southeastern region ranges from \$694 to \$839 per month.
- The average household income in the Southeastern Region is \$68,500.

### *Age*

The population of the Southeastern Region is 2,049,110. The median age ranges from 35.4 in Milwaukee County to 41.9 in Ozaukee County. There are 516,400 people under age 18 in the Southeastern Region, which is 25% of the Region's population.

### *Race and Ethnicity*

Information on race and ethnicity in Ozaukee and Washington Counties comes from the U.S. Census Federal-State Cooperative Program for Population Estimates and as such represents estimates that approximated due to the small sample size that is otherwise used in the U.S. Census 2006 American Community Survey which is the basis of other data in the report. The map in Appendix A indicates that each of the eight counties in the region are predominately White, with a range of 62% White in Milwaukee County to 99% White in Jefferson County. Blacks or African Americans represent the second largest racial group in the region with approximately 14% of the total population. The Hispanics or Latino population (of any race) represents approximately 8% of the eight county region.

### *Housing*

There are 880,746 housing units within the Region, 92% or 808,053 of which are occupied. Homeowners account for 65% of the occupied units; 35% of the population in the Region rent their housing units. The lowest median rent in the Region is Milwaukee County at \$694 per month. Waukesha County has the highest median rent at \$839 per month.

### *Education*

Almost 87% of this Region's residents (1,168,539 people) age 25 and over graduated from high school or beyond, and 18% (245,340 people) have achieved a bachelor's degree. Ozaukee and Waukesha counties have a higher percentage of high school graduates (94%) than all other counties. Milwaukee County is three percentage points lower than the regional average for the percentage of people who are high school educated; about 84% of adults age 25 and over have graduated from high school.

### ***Veteran Status***

Ten percent (148,161 people) of the Region's population 18 years of age and above are veterans. Kenosha County has the highest population of veterans at 12%, while Milwaukee, Ozaukee, and Washington each counties have a veteran population of 9%, 58,680, 6,102, and 8,671 people respectively.

### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 251,136 disabled people over age 4 in the Region. This represents 12% of the Region's population age 5 and over. Across the region, there is a seven-percentage point difference in the percentage of people with disabilities; Ozaukee County at 9%, and Milwaukee County at 16%.

### ***Poverty and Unemployment***

The Southeastern Region unemployment rate ranges from 2.3% in Ozaukee County to 8.1% in Milwaukee County. The average household income is \$68,500. Ozaukee County has the highest average household income in the Region at \$87,793 and Milwaukee County has the lowest average household income at \$53,628. Of the Southeastern Region population, about 9.8% of all people, and 6.9% of all families live below the federal poverty level. The population living below the poverty level ranges from 2.7% of all people in Ozaukee County to 18.5% of all people in Milwaukee County.



## Jefferson County Profile

### Jefferson County Demographic Highlights

- 98.7% of Jefferson County's population is White as compared with regional average of 67.7%.
- 15% of Jefferson County residents have a bachelor's degree.
- Jefferson County has the lowest population in the region at 80,025 residents.

#### ***Age***

The population of Jefferson County is 80,025. The median age in Jefferson County is 37.4. There are 18,391 people under age 18 in Jefferson County, which is 23% of the total population.

#### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Jefferson County, 97.4% of the population is White (77,983 people). There are 379 (0.5%) Blacks or African-Americans, and 345 (0.4%) Asians in Jefferson County. About 320 people (0.4%) are of some other race. People of two or more races are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 1.3% (998 people). Of the total population in Jefferson County, 4,161 people (4.0%) are Hispanic or Latino.

#### ***Housing***

There are 33,580 housing units within the county, of which 90% (30,065) are occupied. Homeowners account for 70% of the occupied units and 30% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$703.

#### ***Education***

Almost 83% of county residents (45,515 people) age 25 and over have graduated from high school or beyond, and 15% (7,740 people) have a bachelor's degree.

#### ***Veteran Status***

Eleven percent (6,852 people) of Jefferson County's population 18 years of age and over are veterans.

#### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 9,706 disabled people over age 4 in Jefferson County. This represents 13% of Jefferson County's population age 5 and older.

#### ***Poverty and Unemployment***

Jefferson County has an unemployment rate of 4.8%. The average household income is \$58,526. Of Jefferson County's population, about 9.5% of all people, and 6.7% of all families live below the federal poverty level.





## Kenosha County Profile

### Kenosha County Demographic Highlights

- Kenosha County is home to the largest percentage of veterans in the region at 12%.
- About 32% of Kenosha County residents are renting their housing units.
- Kenosha County has the lowest percentage of adults with a bachelor's degree at 14%.

#### ***Age***

The population of Kenosha County is 162,001. The median age in Kenosha County is 36.2. There are 42,042 people under age 18 in Kenosha County, which is 26% of the total population.

#### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Kenosha County, 97.9% of the population is White (136,686 people). There are 9,327 (5.9%) Blacks or African-Americans, 502 (0.3%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, and 1,845 (1.2%) Asians in Kenosha County. About 998 people (2.2%) are of two or more races. People of some other race are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 6.4% (10,213 people). Of the total population in Kenosha County, 14,480 people (9.0%) are Hispanic or Latino.

#### ***Housing***

There are 66,654 housing units within the county, of which 90% (59,809) are occupied. Homeowners account for 68% of the occupied units; 32% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$723.

#### ***Education***

Almost 88% of county residents (92,046 people) age 25 and over have graduated from high school or beyond, and 14% (14,461 people) have a bachelor's degree.

#### ***Veteran Status***

Twelve percent (14,267 people) of Kenosha County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

#### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 19,238 disabled people over age 4 in Kenosha County. This represents 13% of Kenosha County's population age 5 and older.

#### ***Poverty and Unemployment***

Kenosha County has an unemployment rate of 7.6%. The average household income is \$63,946. Of Kenosha County's population, about 11.6% of all people, and 7.5% of all families live below the federal poverty level.



## Milwaukee County Profile

### Milwaukee County Demographic Highlights

- Milwaukee County is the most racially and ethnically diverse county in the region. The population is 61.9% white compared with regional average of 67%.
- Milwaukee has the highest percentage of the population with disabilities at 16%.
- The poverty rate in Milwaukee County is the highest in the region at 18.5%

### *Age*

The population of Milwaukee County is 915,097. The median age in Milwaukee County is 35.4. There are 244,240 people under age 18 in Milwaukee County, which is 27% of the total population.

### *Race and Ethnicity*

In Milwaukee County, 61% of the population is White (556,460 people). Blacks or African-Americans are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 26.8% (241,179 people). There are 5,273 (0.6%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, 28,082 (3.1%) Asians, and 559 (0.1%) Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islanders in Milwaukee County. About 67,973 people (7.6%) are of some other race, and 15,571 people (1.7%) are of two or more races. Of the total population in Milwaukee County, 103,873 people (11.4%) are Hispanic or Latino.

### *Housing*

There are 408,160 housing units within the county, of which 92% (376,239) are occupied. Homeowners account for 55% of the occupied units; 45% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$694.

### *Education*

Almost 84% of county residents (487,513 people) age 25 and over graduated from high school or beyond, and 16% (96,073 people) have a bachelor's degree.

### *Veteran Status*

Nine percent (58,680 people) of Milwaukee County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

### *People with Disabilities*

There are a total of 129,789 disabled people over age 4 in Milwaukee County. This represents 16% of the Milwaukee County's population age 5 and over.

***Poverty and Unemployment***

Milwaukee County has an unemployment rate of 8.1%. The average household income is \$53,628. Of Milwaukee County's population, about 18.5% of all people, and 14.1% of all families live below the federal poverty level.



## Ozaukee County Profile

### Ozaukee County Demographic Highlights

- Ozaukee County's has the highest percent of homeowners in the region at 80%.
- Average household income in Ozaukee County is the highest in the region at \$88,793.
- Ozaukee County has the lowest unemployment rate in the region at 3.1%.

#### ***Age***

The population of Ozaukee County is 86,321. The median age in Ozaukee County is 41.9. There are 19,849 people under age 18 in Ozaukee County, which is 23% of the total population.

#### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Ozaukee County, 94.7% of the population is White (358,858 people). Asians are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 1.4% (1,250 people). There are 1,128 (1.3%) Blacks or African-Americans, 175 (0.2%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, and 10 (0.01%) Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islanders in Ozaukee County. About 642 (0.7%) people are of two or more races. Of the total population in Ozaukee County, 1,400 people (1.6%) are Hispanic or Latino.

#### ***Housing***

There are 35,400 housing units within the county, of which 92% (32,643) are occupied. Homeowners account for 80% of the occupied units; 20% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$724.

#### ***Education***

Almost 94% of county residents (54,179 people) age 25 and over graduated from high school or beyond, and 28% (16,418 people) have a bachelor's degree.

#### ***Veteran Status***

Nine percent (6,102 people) of Ozaukee County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

#### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 7,311 disabled people over age 4 in Ozaukee County. This represents 9% of Ozaukee County's population age 5 and older.

***Poverty and Unemployment***

Ozaukee County has an unemployment rate of 2.3%. The average household income is \$88,793. Of Ozaukee County's population, about 2.7% of all people, and 2.4% of all families live below the federal poverty level.



## Racine County Profile

### Racine County Demographic Highlights

- Racine County has the highest unemployment rate in the region at 5.3%.
- 16% of Racine County residents have a bachelor's degree.
- Racine County has a poverty rate of 11.3%.

#### ***Age***

The population of Racine County is 196,096. The median age in Racine County is 37.8. There are 48,983 people under age 18 in Racine County, which is 25% of the total population.

#### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Racine County, 83.6% of the population is White (161,345 people). Blacks or African-Americans are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 10.9% (21,063 people). There are 726 (0.4%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, and 1,816 (0.9%) Asians in Racine County. About 7,940 people (4.1%) are of some other race, and 3,206 people (1.7%) are of two or more races. Of the total population in Racine County, 18,818 people (10%) are Hispanic or Latino.

#### ***Housing***

There are 80,130 housing units within the county, of which 94% (75,154) are occupied. Homeowners account for 71% of the occupied units; 29% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$637.

#### ***Education***

Almost 86% of county residents (111,274 people) graduated from high school or beyond, and 16% (20,401 people) have a bachelor's degree.

#### ***Veteran Status***

Eleven percent (16,476 people) of Racine County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

#### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 23,588 disabled people over age 4 in Racine County. This represents 13% of the Racine County's population age 5 and older.

#### ***Poverty and Unemployment***

Racine County has an unemployment rate of 6.3%. The average household income is \$62,271. Of Racine County's population, about 11.3% of all people, and 8.8% of all families live below the federal poverty level.



## Walworth County Profile

### Walworth County Demographic Highlights

- 96% of Walworth County's population is White compared with the regional average of 67.7%.
- 16% of Walworth County residents have a bachelor's degree.
- Walworth County has the second largest percentage of disabled residents at 14%.

### ***Age***

The population of Walworth County is 101,007. The median age in Walworth County is 36.7. There are 22,719 people under age 18 in Walworth County, which is 23% of the total population.

### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Walworth County, 96% of the population is White (95,821 people). There are 618 (0.6%) Blacks or African-Americans, 111 (0.1%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, and 744 (0.7%) Asians in Walworth County. About 1,160 people (1.7%) are of two or more races. People of some other race are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 2.6% (2,553 people). Of the total population in Walworth County, 8,688 people (9%) are Hispanic or Latino.

### ***Housing***

There are 49,671 housing units within the county, of which 76% (37,863) are occupied. Homeowners account for 73% of the occupied units; 27% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$725.

### ***Education***

Almost 90% of county residents (58,488 people) age 25 and over graduated from high school or beyond, and 16% (10,476 people) have bachelor's degree.

### ***Veteran Status***

Ten percent (8,140 people) of Walworth County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 12,734 disabled people over age 4 in Walworth County. This represents 14% of Walworth County's population age 5 and older.

### ***Poverty and Unemployment***

Walworth County has an unemployment rate of 6.8%. The average household income is \$62,031. Of Walworth County's population, about 13.4% of all people, and 8.3% of all families live below the federal poverty level.



## Washington County Profile

### Washington County Demographic Highlights

- The average household income in Washington County is \$71,462.
- 16% of Washington County residents have a bachelor's degree.
- Washington County has the second highest median rent in the region at \$738 per month.

#### ***Age***

The population of Washington County is 127,578. The median age in Washington County is 38.6. There are 30,609 people under age 18 in Washington County, which is 24% of the total population.

#### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Washington County, 95.8% of the population is White (122,225 people). Asians are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 0.8% (1,070 people). There are 1,014 (0.8%) Blacks or African-Americans, 301 (0.2%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, and 33 (0.03%) Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islanders in Washington County. About 781 (0.6%) people are of two or more races. Of the total population in Washington County, 2,154 people (1.7%) are Hispanic or Latino.

#### ***Housing***

There are 52,490 housing units within the county, of which 95% (49,966) are occupied. Homeowners account for 76% of the occupied units; 24% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$738.

#### ***Education***

Almost 90% of county residents (77,825 people) have graduated high school or beyond, and 16% (13,977 people) have a bachelor's degree.

#### ***Veteran Status***

Nine percent (8,671 people) of Washington County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

#### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 13,523 disabled people over age 4 in Washington County. This represents 11% of Washington County's population age 5 or older.



***Poverty and Unemployment***

Washington County has an unemployment rate of 3.8%. The average household income is \$71,462. Of Washington County's population, about 7.7% of all people, and 4.7% of all families live below the federal poverty level.



## Waukesha County Profile

### Waukesha County Demographic Highlights

- Waukesha County has the second largest population in the region at 380,985 people.
- Rents in Waukesha County are the highest in the region at \$839 per month.
- Waukesha County has the second lowest unemployment rate at 3.4%.

#### ***Age***

The population of Waukesha County is 380,985. The median age in Waukesha County is 40.6. There are 89,567 people under age 18 in Waukesha County, which is 24% of the total population.

#### ***Race and Ethnicity***

In Waukesha County, 95.2% of the population is White (358,858 people). Asians are the largest non-White racial group in the county at 2.5% (9,383 people). There are 4,659 (1.2%) Blacks or African-Americans, 810 (0.2%) American Indian and Alaska Natives, and 141 (0.04%) Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islanders in Waukesha County. About 3,292 (0.9%) people are of some other race, and 3,842 people (1%) are of two or more races. Of the total population in Waukesha County, 12,267 people (3%) are Hispanic or Latino.

#### ***Housing***

There are 154,661 housing units within the county, of which 95% (146,314) are occupied. Homeowners account for 78% of the occupied units; 22% of the population rent their housing units. The median amount of rent paid monthly is \$839.

#### ***Education***

Almost 94% of county residents (241,699 people) age 25 and over graduated from high school or beyond, and 26% (65,794 people) have a bachelor's degree.

#### ***Veteran Status***

Ten percent (28,973 people) of the Waukesha County's population 18 years of age and above are veterans.

#### ***People with Disabilities***

There are a total of 35,247 disabled people over age 4 in Waukesha County. This represents 10% of Waukesha County's population age 5 and older.

***Poverty and Unemployment***

Waukesha County has an unemployment rate of 3.5%. The average household income is \$87,340. Of Waukesha County's population, about 3.9% of all people, and 2.7% of all families live below the federal poverty level.

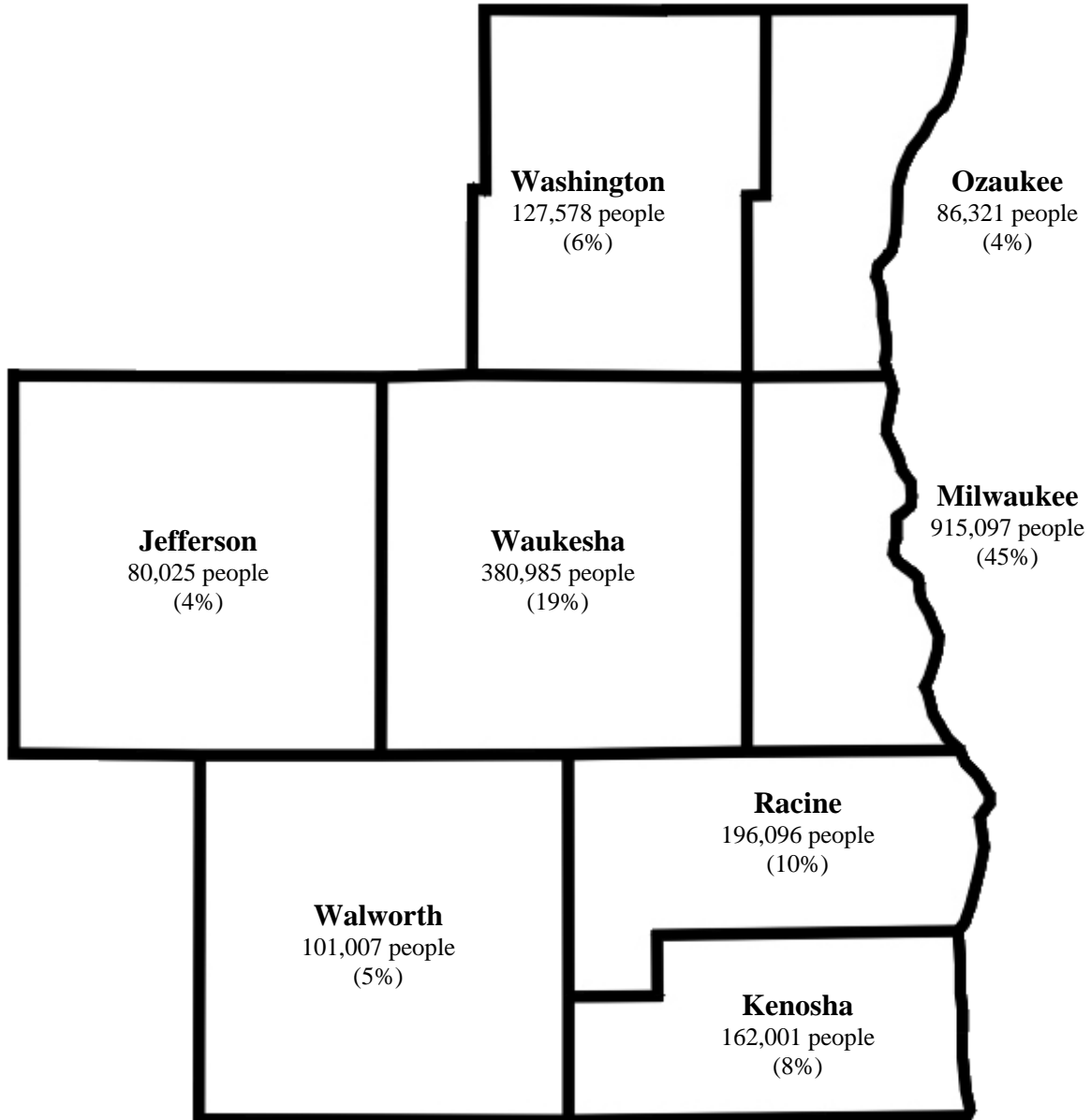

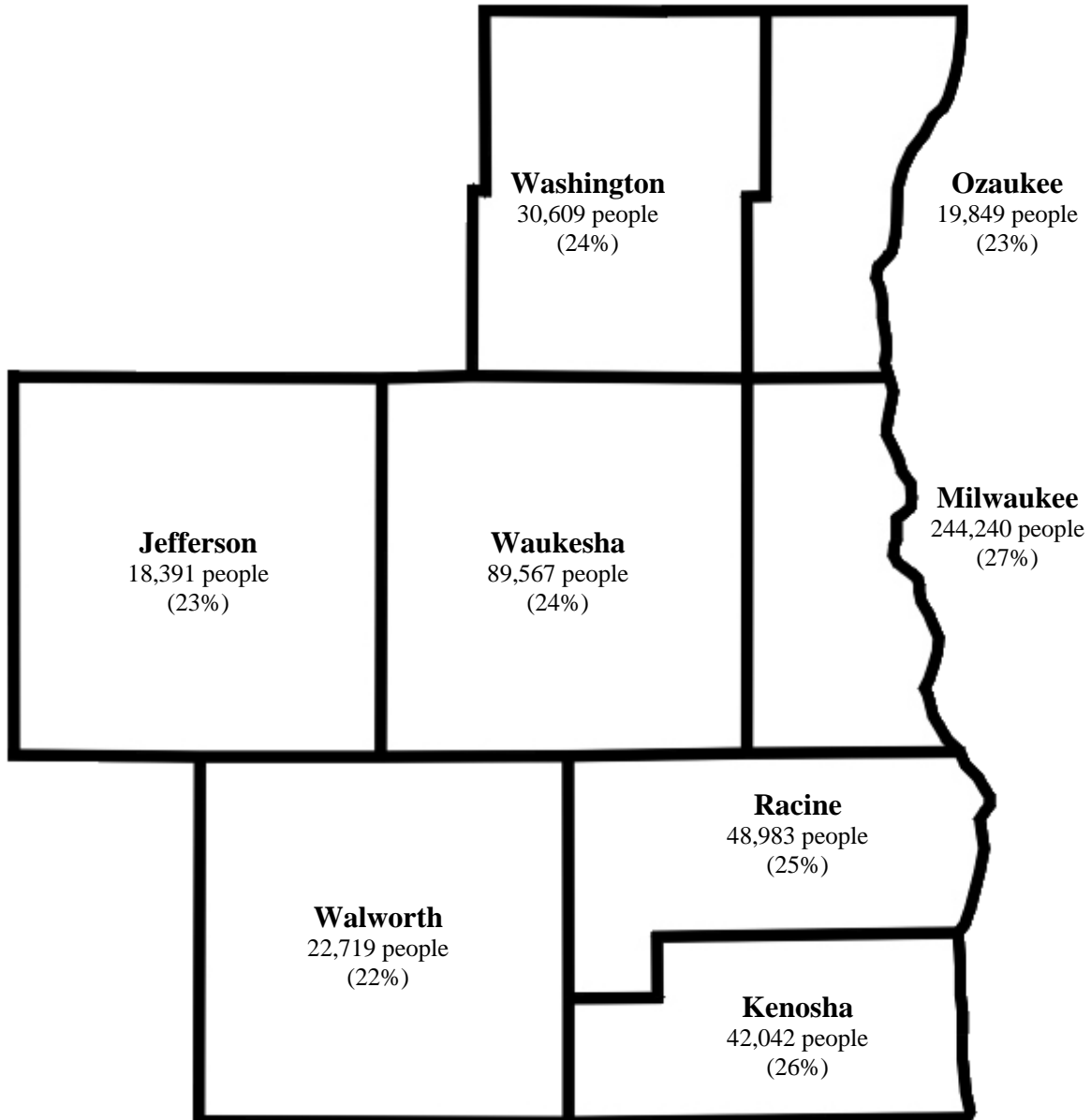
**Total Population by County of the

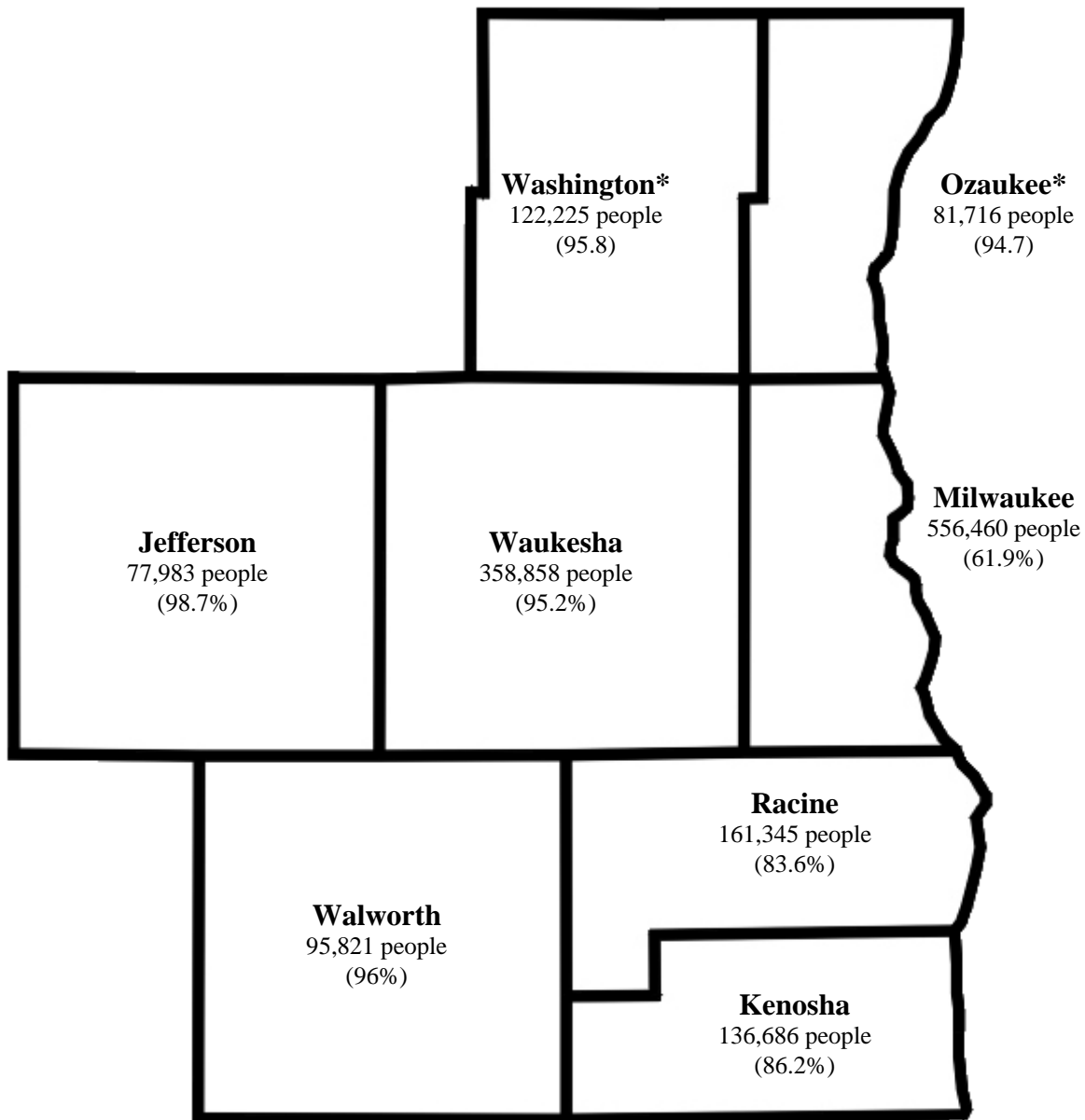
**Population under Age 18 by County in the

Southeastern Region**

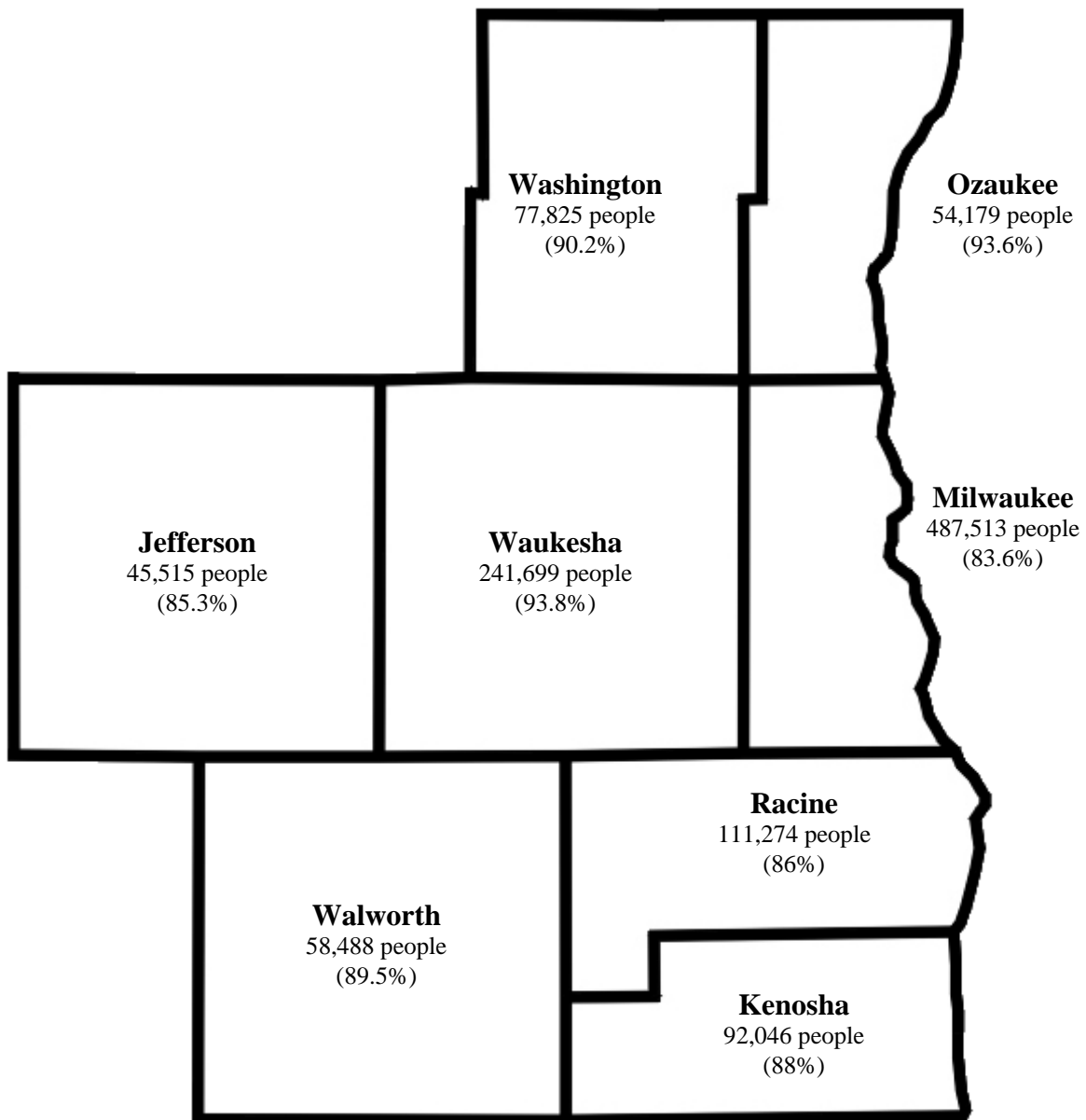

Southeastern Region**

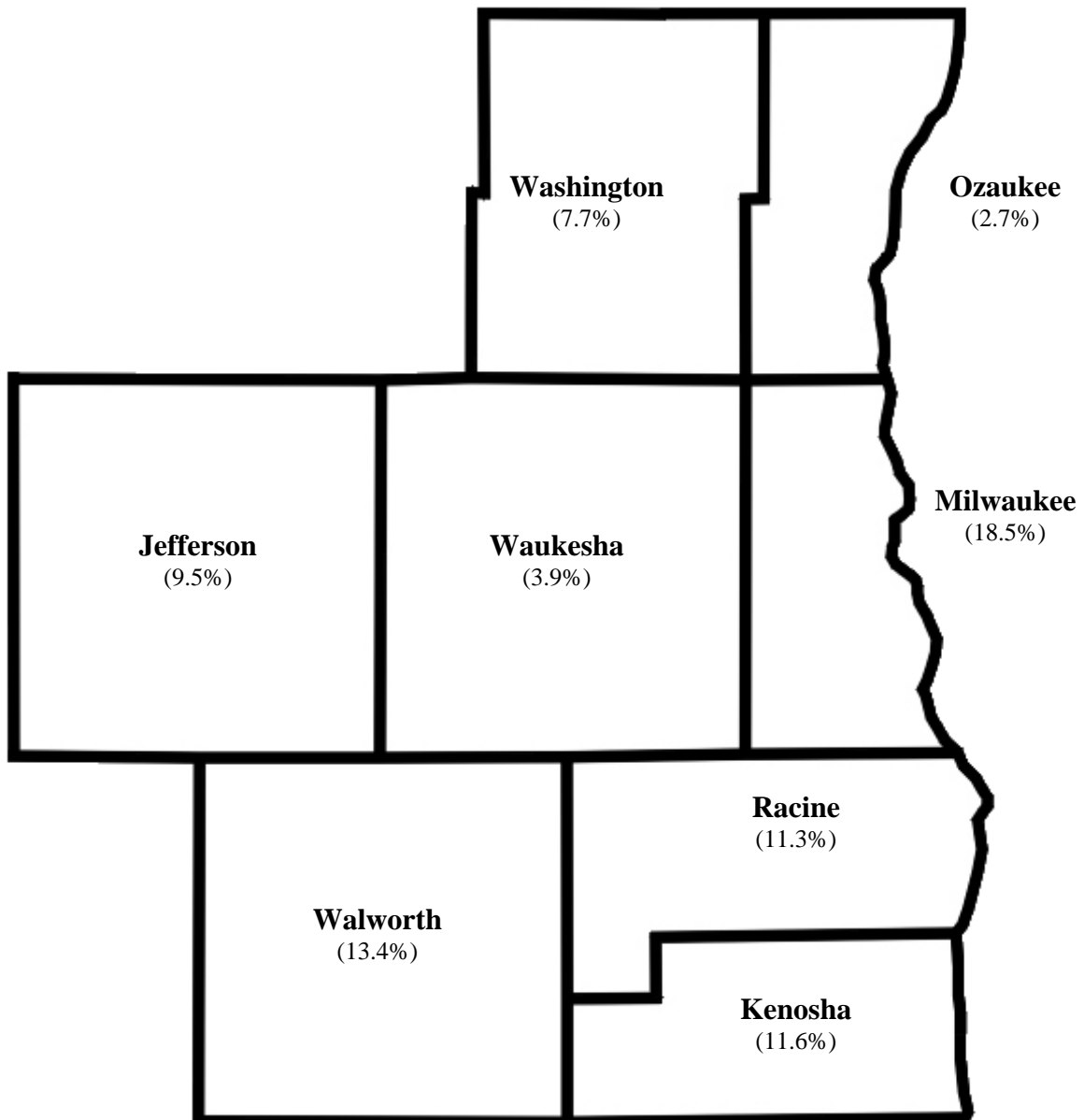
